Leader Dog Puppy Raisers To Speak

Longtime Leader Dog Puppy Raisers Marilee and Phil Townsend will be the featured speakers for the November 4 general meeting.

The Townsends will share their experiences with the program as well as the history of the Leader Dogs in Rochester. They will also bring a puppy with them as a "live demonstration" of teaching techniques.

Puppies are placed in host homes for approximately one year in preparation for their lives as dog guides. Raisers teach puppies house manners and basic obedience, and they socialize the dog by taking it into the community on a regular basis.


There will be no *Brown Bag Lunch* meeting in November because of the election.

Woodward House Update

Again, thank you for all of your support as we move forward with our "Preserving the Woodward House" project. Prior to the Planning Commission meeting on October 4, Singh Development notified the City of Rochester Administration that it was withdrawing their application for rezoning of the property adjacent to the Woodward House prop-

erty. Singh had been in negotiation with the Congregational Church regarding lots that are owned by the Church on the east side of Pine Street. An agreement could not be reached and Singh Development has ceased any further negotiations. So we are back at square one. What will happen next? Only time will tell. If Singh Development wants to revert back to their original plan or another plan, they would have to resubmit an application for rezoning. Singh Development had an option to buy on the two pieces of property not including the Church property. Whether they will continue to hold those options or back away, it is unclear at this time. We are not part of their negotiations so we must wait and see. Thank you to Singh Development for all their effort in trying to make this work and saving the Woodward House. I will let everyone know if and when we have more information to share.

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Research Committee Update

On September 24, four members of the Research Committee traveled to Lansing to attend the meeting of the State Historic Preservation Review



Board. Deborah Larsen formally presented the nomination of the Rochester Elevator to the National Register of Historic Places, and the nomination was unanimously approved by the review board. The nomination has now been sent, with state government endorsement, to the U.S. Department of the In-

terior in Washington, D.C., where it is under review by the Office of the Keeper of the National Register, which will make the final decision about listing the property. We expect to receive notification of the final decision from the federal government by the end of this year.

In the meantime, committee members are hard at work on other projects. The Research Committee is just one year old, but we have already submitted one National Register nomination, done the research for two others which will soon begin the formal nomination process, and we are continuing to research the Bunker Park/McAleer property in preparation for a nomination of that area. The committee is still seeking contact with anyone who

worked for McAleer during the WWII era, or anyone who might have photos, documents or other memorabilia related to McAleer's wartime work that may assist our research.

Lysander Woodward

Deborah Larsen Remember Rochester

Lysander Woodward was a strong advocate of modern farming methods, and made his own farm and home a showplace to promote them. He was active in the Oakland County Agricultural Society and served for a time as its president. In 1867, his farm was one of three "model farms" awarded monetary prizes by the society, and a lengthy description of the Woodward operation, including the house, was published in the report of the secretary of the state board of agriculture in that year. Interestingly, the judges of the contest agreed that the farm was modern and prosperous and they also liked the house, but they felt that the yard was too small for such a grand mansion and recommended that it be expanded.

Local politics attracted Lysander Woodward in 1856 when he was elected Supervisor of Avon Township. He would go on to hold a number of public offices in his career, including justice of the peace, Oakland County Treasurer, member of the Michigan House of Representatives, and chairman of the Michigan constitutional convention of 1873. He also made an unsuccessful bid for lieutenant governor of Michigan on the Greenback ticket in 1878.

His greatest legacy for Rochester, however, was Lysander Woodward's role in bringing the first railroad line through the village. He worked tirelessly to secure local funding and right-of-way for the Detroit & Bay City Railroad, which laid its track through Rochester in 1872. The railroad brought rapid transportation and communication to a sleepy village, and with it the economic prosperity that arose from a reliable connection to the outside world. Soon after the rails arrived, Rochester had a successful newspaper, a grain elevator, ready access to Detroit markets, and booming business. Lysander Woodward was named the first president of the Detroit & Bay City Railroad, which soon became part of the larger Michigan Central Railroad system.

When Lysander Woodward died in January 1880, his funeral was probably unlike any that had been seen in Rochester to that point – or possibly since.


