You may already have heard that the bill to amend the state's enabling legislation for historic districts has died in committee. The draft bill included provisions that would significantly weaken local historic district ordinances throughout the state and place many irreplaceable historic resources at risk. We have not, however, heard the last of this and still need to remain vigilant – the bill may be introduced in a different form at a later date.



#### "Lost Car Companies of Detroit"

Among more than 200 auto companies that tried their luck in the Motor City, just three remain: Ford, General Motors and Chrysler. But many of those lost to history have colorful stories worth telling. For instance, J.J. Cole forgot to put brakes in his new auto, so on the first test run, he had to drive it in circles until it ran out of gas. Brothers John and

Horace Dodge often trashed saloons during wild evenings but used their great personal wealth to pay for the damage the next day (if they could remember where they had been). David D. Buick went from being the founder of his own leading auto company to working the information desk at the Detroit Board of Trade. Author Alan Naldrett explores these and more tales of automakers who utimately failed but shaped the industry and designs putting wheels on the road today.

Alan Naldrett is a Michigan historian with master's degrees in Archival Science and Library and Information Science from Wayne State University. He received his bacheslor's degree from Michigan State University where he started one of the nation's first used record stores. He was an academic research librarian at Baker College of Auburn Hills for over 10 years, where he edited the student and the alumni newsletters as well as maintaining their college's archives.

Alan owned a comic book store and was a commercial insurance broker in California. He was a charter member of the Macomb County Historical Commission and is the Treasurer and past President of the Chesterfield Township Public Library Board of Trustees. He plays in a blues band, has written six books and writes articles for many different publications. "The Lost Car Companies of Detroit" is his latest book.

#### New Member John Mohr's Memories and Motivation

John Mohr joined the Rochester-Avon Historical Society in April of this year. Originally from Royal Oak, he moved to Rochester in 1968.

His father, John Sr., taught 5th grade in the Center Line school system for 45 years. He also volunteered to work with troubled teenaged boys and served part time as a scout master. His mother, Olga, worked for 10 years in the fabrics department at Mitzelfeld's department store, which is where John was hired for his first job while still in high school.

John has many happy memories of growing up in Rochester. He remembers seeing "The Sound of Music" at the Hills Theater. He also laughs when he shares how he and his friends liked to improvise Hardy Boy mysteries in which he always played the role of Frank Hardy. They especially liked to sneak onto the grounds of <a href="mailto:the Haven sanitarium">the Haven sanitarium (now Grosse Pines subdivision)</a> looking for treasure or making up other mysteries. They even befriended the Haven's guard dogs by bringing meat treats so they could play without fear of the dogs or of getting caught.



After earning both his bachelor and masters degrees from Lawrence Tech, majoring in finance and computer information systems, John spent the next 25 years working in various positions for MetLife Insurance Company.
