RAHS is planning a trip to the [Stahls Automotive Museum & Collection](#), 56516 North Bay Dr., Chesterfield, Mich., on Saturday, Oct. 7.

The auto collection alone has cars you have never seen before, including some from Hollywood motion pictures. Throughout the museum you will see Route 66 Americana and art displays, Depression-era cars, racing vehicles, classic trucks and the Tucker attraction. In addition, there are several music machines. One of the main attractions is the 1926 Mortier Calliope, which is probably the largest music machine you will ever see.

We are offering the option to carpool from Rochester to the museum, which is approximately a 45-minute drive. If you prefer to drive yourself and meet up at the museum, we've included the address above for your convenience.

The plan is to arrive at Stahls at 10:45 a.m. and to make a grand entrance at 11:00 a.m. when they open.

There is no admission fee; the museum depends on a donation box. After the tour of the museum, the plan is to have a late lunch (1:00 p.m.) at Dimitri's restaurant, 50875 Gratiot Avenue, New Baltimore (south of 23 Mile Road).

We look forward to a good turnout for this event, because we hope to organize more of these trips in the future.

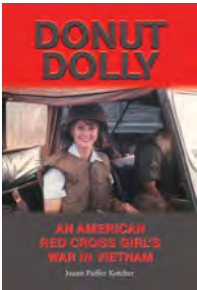

"Donut Dolly"

In honor of the 50th Commemoration of the Vietnam War, Joan Puffer Kotcher will discuss her experiences as an unarmed Red Cross civilian in combat zones during the Vietnam War. The original "Donut Dollies" ventured out to different operating areas in WWII and Korea. They passed out sundry items, played records, served hot coffee and fresh donuts and visited with the soldiers.

Between February 1962 and March 1973, the Vietnam Donut Dollies logged over 2,000,000 miles by Jeep, deuce-and-a-half and helicopters visiting combat troops at remote fire bases. And they didn't pass out a single donut. They traveled in pairs and brought smiles, songs, games and a touch of "back home."

Based on a diary she kept, her book "Donut Dolly, An American Red Cross Girl's War in Vietnam" tells real stories of men at war and gives tribute to our military's bravery. The only book about Vietnam written by a woman, it has received numerous awards; it was nominated for a Distinguished Writing Award of the Army Historical Foundation, given a national award for Women in American History by the Daughters of the American Revolution, and recommended for school and public libraries by the American Library Association. The Donut Dolly book will be in its second printing in the fall of 2017 and will be available for sale at this event.

Kotcher was born in Harbor Beach, Michigan. She graduated from the University of Michigan with a degree in math and later earned an M.B.A.

She is one of only 100 Donut Dollies who remain out of over 600 girls, and she is the only one in Michigan. Kotcher lives in the Rochester area with her husband.

"Forgotten Tales of Michigan's Lower Peninsula"

Alan Naldrett, author, historian and humorist, will discuss some of Michigan's most noteworthy yarns and compelling characters which have been lost down the corridors of history. He will introduce us to the ghostly Nain Rouge, that Demon from the Strait, spotted everywhere from the Battle of Bloody Run in 1763 (the site of present-day Elmwood Cemetery) to the Detroit Riot in 1967. He will reveal details of the Toledo War with its ill-equipped militia and their armament that included a barrel of whiskey and broom handles from the local hardware store. This war is easily forgotten ... the Michigan and Ohio armies never engaged in battle because both got lost in the Great Black Swamp.



Naldrett collected these forgotten Michigan stories from research trips to Toledo, Monroe, Detroit and throughout southeast Michigan. He arrived at his career as an author after a variety of endeavors. While earning a bachelor's degree at Michigan State University, he opened one of the first used vinyl student record stores. He was a blues and rock musician as well as a stock and insurance broker. After the age of 50, Naldrett earned master's degrees in archival science and library and information science from Wayne State University. He worked as an academic research librarian at Baker College in Auburn Hills for 10 years while writing a number of books. His efforts include *Images of America: Chesterfield Township* and *Lost Towns of Eastern Michigan*.

You may recall that Mr. Naldrett discussed his book, *Lost Car Companies of Detroit*, during the September 2016 RAHS evening meeting.
