

## HENRY M. DEWEY

Henry M. Dewey, the wellknown farmer of South Avon, went to his barn at about five o'clock last Saturday morning to attend to his chores but not returning for breakfast his wife became anxious about him. She went to the door and noticing the barn door open, which was unusual on cold mornings, she started out to investigate. As she approached the barn she was frightened at finding the form of her husband lying prostrate on the floor. Coroner Farmer, of Pontiac, was summoned and Dr. Strain of Rochester, was sent for. Mr. Dewey had taken off his mittens to go to work milking his cows when he evidently was stricken then and there.

Mr. Dewey removed from Rochester about three years ago, to one of the William Webster farms, in South Avon, it being an inheritance of his wife's from her father. During nearly all the years he lived in Rochester he had been engaged either as a butcher or drover and perhaps no man in this section of country was better known than Henry M. Dewey. He leaves a wife and four daughters: Mrs. Edith Ferguson of South Avon; Mrs. Blanche Hovey, living at home; Mrs. Carrie Cowells and Miss Maude Dewey, of Detroit. Funeral services were held from the late home Wednesday morning. He was born and brought up in Troy and was 69 years of age.

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
