

## MILO P. NEWBERRY

Milo P. Newberry, aged 83 years, a well known and highly respected resident of Avon Township, for the past 65 years, died in his home southeast of the village on New Years morning 1909 of paralysis. Though very active for a man of his years, his health has been gradually failing of late, and his death, though hastened by the stroke was no great surprise. Mr. Newberry was born in New York state but came to Michigan when but a mere boy, buying and locating upon the farm where he spent his declining years. Two saw mills erected upon the Clinton River by the deceased are now crumbling to decay.

Deceased was a member of several farmers' clubs and took an active part in the discussions. The funeral was held from the home at one o'clock Sunday afternoon, Rev. Lindsay of the Congregational Church, officiating. Interment was made in the Rochester Cemetery. A widow, Mrs. Eliza Newberry, two daughters, Mrs. William Howell and Miss Mary Newberry and four sons, Charles and Frank Newberry of Washington state, Arthur F. Newberry, Pontiac, and Burton Newberry of Warren, survive him and have the deepest sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.
